# Holly Ryan Receives the 2024 Red Shoe Award

#### A Remarkable Journey of Service and Leadership

The Christ Child Society of Milwaukee is proud to announce Holly Ryan as the recipient of the prestigious 2024 Red Shoe Award. Holly's unwavering commitment to service, leadership, and compassion has left an indelible mark on our community.

#### **A Legacy of Leadership**

Holly Ryan's journey with CCS began in 2004, and since then, she has worn many hats within the organization. Her tenure as co-president during the challenging 2020 -2021 period, marked by pandemic-related disruptions, showcased her resilience and dedication. Despite the obstacles, Holly ensured that CCS continued its vital work, supporting children and families in need.



#### **Nurturing the Follow the Child Philosophy**

As co-director of the Second Saturday program, Holly embodies the "Follow the Child" philosophy. She believes in empowering children, mothers, and grandmothers who participate in this initiative. Her determination and hard work were instrumental in reviving the program after a two-year hiatus caused by pandemic re-

strictions. Recognizing that not everyone can commit to ongoing programs, Holly initiated one-day projects, including her involvement with the Milwaukee Diaper Mission project.

#### **Building Bridges and Making a Difference**

Holly's impact reaches far beyond CCS. She has forged meaningful relationships with organizations such as Hope Network and the 16th Street Community Center. She is a vice president for St. Bakhita Catholic Worker House; a residence for women who have been sex trafficked or abused. Working with Our Lady of Good Hope Parish, Holly is helping facilitate a program similar to our Second Saturday program at All Saints.

Additionally, she is involved in providing spiritual support at three facilities – Ozaukee County Jail, Milwaukee Women's Correctional Center and Milwaukee County Jail. Holly's heartwarming contribution to the layette program involves collecting yarn so the women at the Center can knit and crochet beautiful baby items, as well as items for Senior citizens. She distributes the baby items to our Layette program and takes the other items to various senior citizen facilities and to Community Projects for Seniors. Her efforts ensure that even the tiniest members of our community receive love and care.





#### **Humble Gratitude**

Upon receiving the Red Shoe Award, Holly expressed her gratitude: "I am truly humbled by this recognition. Like everyone else in the Christ Child Society, I believe in action. At the banquet, I shared a quote by Edwin Markham: 'There is a destiny that makes us brothers (sisters). None goes his (her) way alone. All that we put into the lives of others comes back into our own."

Holly Ryan exemplifies the spirit of selflessness and compassion. Her tireless efforts remind us that "nothing is ever too much to do for a child." Congratulations, Holly, on this well-deserved honor!


#### **Small libraries**

# Layettes: Meeting a timely need

During the past year, the Christ Child Society provided 1,683 layettes to eight Milwaukee area hospitals and social service agencies. More than 60 members volunteered with the assembly, along with many more who knit and sew items. We would like to highlight four of our amazing volunteers.

- Everything starts with Nancy Hyndman, who emails the hospitals and agency locations to find out how
  many layettes they need for the next month. The social workers let Nancy know how many boys, girls,
  Spanish and English layettes are needed. Nancy lets the chairpersons know how many layettes need to
  be assembled and delivered.
- Nancy's updates are given to **Patty Boettcher** and **Geri Schmitz.** Patty counts out and marks all of the bags with the name of the hospital and Spanish if it is for a Spanish-speaking mother.
- Geri also receives the counts for the month since she orders the books and assembles the information
  packets. She orders the "Calm Your Baby" and "Read To Your Baby" brochures and prints flyers for the
  Resale Shop to put in each layette.
- Barbara Lauby keeps the inventory current so that we have all of the items for each month's assembly.
   Since we average 150 layettes each month, Barbara shops around to get the best possible prices and quality. Barbara is a pro at it for instance, when the baby bottle vendor can't deliver, she searches for another source.

# Father Michael: Glory beyond all comparison

Change is the only thing we can really count on! I have enjoyed my time as your spiritual advisor, but it now has to come to an end.

As I move to Sheboygan Falls and Kohler to take care of two parishes, I have to exchange all the people I have gotten to know at Christ King, St. Bernard's and all the other places I've been able to help out at and be a part of, like the Christ Child, for people I have not yet met! This process carries with it a very reasonable difficulty, but it has brought me several good reflections that I would like to share.

We read this from Paul's letter to the Corinthians on the 10<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time this year, "For this momentary light affliction is producing for us an eternal weight of glory beyond all comparison, as we look not to what is seen but to what is unseen; for what is seen is transitory, but what is unseen is eternal."

This momentary affliction Paul speaks of is about our "Outer selves" passing away. Along with it are many other circumstances or things that pass away, or change. This change does indeed levy us with a variety of afflictions, whether it's moving, aging, changing habits, or being separated from loved ones through death.

All these changes effect so much, but they leave behind something even greater. Every good thing we encounter, every person we know, every time we serve, every time we love creates something eternal. Even when the temporary good things pass away we always have what is left. The "unseen" which is

Even though I have to leave two



parish communities, the good that has been done, the relationships I have formed and all I have been able to share will not be kept in a passing ledger of this world, but in God's eternal ledger in heaven.

All things that change pull us into an appreciation of the God that never changes. Amidst the world where changes bring struggle and difficulty we can long for God's great promise in our reunification in the kingdom of Heaven! While it does not lessen the sting of goodbyes, Paul's reminder to the Corinthians and us is to remember the greater unchanging reality which is unseen, but certainly present!

The eternal glory of heaven will reunite those that are separated, and the love which we share is never lost, but held in store for us when we finally arrive at our heavenly home!

Thank you so much for your time with me as your spiritual advisor, know of my prayers for you as you continue the good work God has called you to! May you be rewarded eternally for all the service and love you give to the children of this passing world!


